



The Ratsborn Gates
These simple yet exquisitely elegant wrought iron gates were brought to Wyanep by Lady Frances Anne, from the Cathedral of Ratsborn in Bavaria.



Hambletonian
Next to the Edible Garden stands a wire sculpture of Hambletonian, Sir Henry Vane Tempest's famous horse, who is said to be one of the greatest racehorses of the 18th century. Crafted by local Artist, Emma Stohard, the installation was commissioned by Allison, to mark the opening of the Glass House and Edible Garden in 2016.

Arboretum:
The Arboretum dating back to 1822 comprises of 18 different species including ash, oak, beech and elm as well as Norway spruce, scotch fir, mountain ash, horse chestnut, weeping birch and hazel. Originally the trees grown had specific uses to the Londonerry colliery empire as well as providing scenic beauty however now they offer a peaceful and meditating journey through the valley.

Monuments:
Hidden in our trees and historic footpaths are temples, ornamental gates, obelisks and even graves. With a history spanning hundreds of years many of the original features have now gone, but clues left in the landscape allow the imagination to recreate. Keep an eye out for the Roman and Greek temples, Goshawks Grave and the Ratsborn Gates during your visit.

Know Your Roses...

The Walled Garden is home to 3,000 dazzling DavidAustin roses in 145 different species. The fragrant flowers often bloom until September and October, while Wild Erdic and Lady Shalott are among the earliest flowering. Each rose is numbered and corresponds with the index below.

The opening of the Walled Garden in 2015, saw this legacy reinstated as part of the realisation of Sir John Hall's personal ambition to create one of the most exquisite rose gardens in the UK. Now this showcase of stunning architecture and delicate artistry has become much more than a picturesque plot, as Sir John's daughter Allison continues her father's legacy, extending the Wynyard estate and shaping an enchanting realm to inspire future generations.

Originally developed in 1822 during the Londonderry family's residence. The Gardens formed both a beautiful visitor attraction and part of Wynyard's sustainable estate for decades until they closed shortly before the war.

The Gardens at Wynyard Hall

The Edible Garden is also home to The Glasshouse, a beautiful Victorian-inspired glass structure brimming with beautiful interior design that now houses our plot to plate restaurant now where diners can see the garden from which their food is grown, picked and then served. Our Kitchen Gardener works closely with our Chefs throughout the year to ensure the produce is reflective of a seasonal menu and together they create the best in plot to plate dining throughout the region.

A stunning example of sustainable development, the Edible Garden is inspired by the Londonderry's former kitchen garden, although much of it was situated in that area that now forms the Walled Garden.

The Edible Garden, which opened in September 2016 now supplies the kitchens at Wynyard Hall with a bounty of fruit, vegetables and herbs all year round.

Step Back in Time

In 1822, Lord Charles Stewart and Lady Frances Anne Vane Tempest embarked on ambitious landscaping plans with the help of former water colour painter, William Sawrey Gilpin. He had no horticultural qualifications but was experienced in draughtmanship, with an artistic eye and subsequently designed hundreds of gardens across the UK. The original garden design featured gently curved flowerbeds, raised terrace walks, irregularly shaped shrubberies and winding paths.

1886-1915
Teresa, Lady Londonderry developed The Gardens, incorporating vivid flower beds, densely packed with brightly colored plants and foliage, creating the most striking floral show. Until the war in 1939, more than two dozen gardeners worked at Wynyard Hall. Gibble was named as one of the foremost gardeners of the day and his successor, Joseph Henry Yarrow, is remembered for greenhouse gardening, growing exotic fruits.

1987
Always fascinated by roses, as a young boy, Sir John Hall watched his father tend to flowers in their garden in Ashington. At the age of 14 he made a promise to himself that one day he would have a rose garden of his own. In 1987 he purchased Wynyard Hall and knew it was time to craft his vision. The Gardens had lain derelict for decades, and with the help of expert consultants and specialist craftsmen he embarked on a major restoration project that is fast becoming one of the finest rose gardens in the UK.
